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AIR TRAVEL: RULES RELAXED

Travelers are given new list

What's OK now

After almost two months, several items are approved again by the Transportation Security Administration to carry onto planes.

• **Up to 3 ounces** of lotions and gels. Containers must be placed in quart-sized or smaller zip-top bags.

• **Up to 4 ounces** of saline solution, eye drops, nonprescription medication and personal lubricants.

• **Drinks and other** liquids purchased inside security checkpoints will be permitted onboard.

▶ Drinks, gels can be purchased inside security checkpoints.

WASHINGTON — Passengers will be able to carry lotions and gels onto airliners again after a six-week ban — but only in tiny containers of 3 ounces or less and only if they're in clear zip-top plastic bags.

Starting Tuesday, air travelers also will be able to buy drinks or other liquids or gels at shops inside airport security checkpoints and carry them on board under partially relaxed anti-terror rules.

If a passenger brings a container larger than 3 ounces from outside, it will still have to be put in checked baggage.

The outright ban on such carry-on items, ordered Aug. 10 after an alleged plot to bomb U.S.-bound jetliners was foiled, is no longer needed, Transportation

Pope: Violence must be rejected

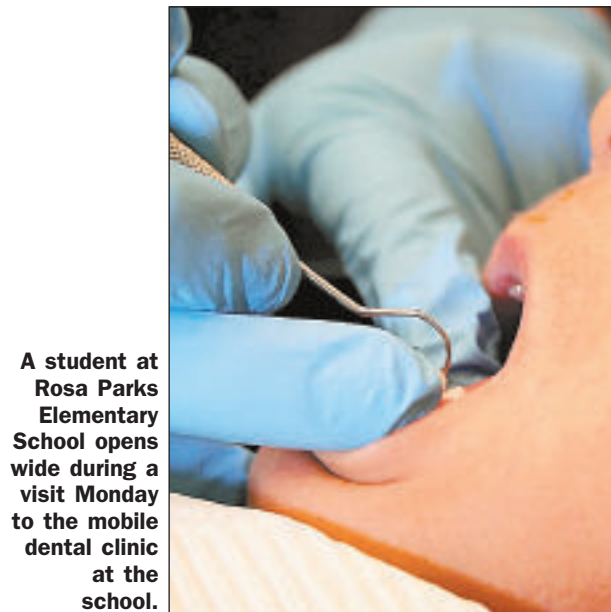
CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy — Seeking to end anger in the Islamic world over his remarks on holy war, Pope Benedict XVI told Muslim envoys Monday their two faiths must overcome historic enmities and together reject violence, saying the future of humanity is at stake.

The pope also urged “reciprocity” in religious freedom, calling for preserving the rights of Christians throughout the Islamic world.

“The circumstances which have given rise to our gathering are well known,” Benedict said, referring to his remarks on Islam in a Sept. 12 speech at Regensburg University in Germany, which set off protests around the Muslim world.

He did not dwell on the con-

FILLING a need

Several Union elementary schools have joined the fight against childhood tooth decay. Students can get their teeth cleaned, have them X-rayed or even have cavities filled this week at some schools in the district.

Union began this program through ReachOut Healthcare America, an Arizona-based provider services organization that reached 65,000 students last year through its mobile dentistry programs, said Margo Seck, a program developer.

The first clinic was offered last week at Clark Elementary School. It was moved Monday to Rosa Parks Elementary School and will head Tuesday to Grove Elementary School and finish Thursday at Boevers Elementary School.

The services are designed for students from low-income families who otherwise would receive no dental care, and it is free for those who qualify for Medicaid or SoonerCare.

Uninsured children are seen at discounted rates or have their visits funded through donations. School districts pay nothing for the services.

Seck said that a higher percentage of children today have unrepaired cavities than the kids of 10 years ago did. Reach-Out America will provide the clinics in 21 Tulsa-area school districts in the coming months, she said.

“We fill a niche,” Seck said. “The main reasons kids don't see dentists are, No. 1, accessibility — parents are working and can't take time off; and No. 2, lack of transportation.”

Dr. Aliakber Akberali, a local dentist hired for the Union program, said his passion was serving the public, especially children.

“I've always enjoyed public dentistry, because there's not a lot out there to help the underprivileged and underprivileged children,” Akberali said from the science

GLOBAL WARMING: REACHING RECORD

Earth's temperature highest in millennia, researchers say

WASHINGTON — Earth's temperature has climbed to levels not seen in thousands of years, a warming that has begun to affect plants and animals, researchers report in Tuesday's issue of Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

The Earth has been warming at a rate of 0.36 degree Fahrenheit per decade for the last 30 years, according to the research team led by James Hansen of NASA's Goddard Institute

for Space Studies in New York.

That brings the overall temperature to the warmest in the current interglacial period, which began about 12,000 years ago.

The researchers noted that a report in the journal Nature found that 1,700 plant, animal and insect species moved poleward at an average rate of about four miles per decade in the last half of the 20th century.

GLOBAL WARMING: ANOTHER ATTACK

Inhofe calls climate warnings hysteria fed by activist media

WASHINGTON — Sen. Jim Inhofe linked God to weather cycles as he lashed out at the media and others Monday for recklessly promoting what he sees as alarmist warnings against global warming.

“God's still up there, and we still have the cycles every 1,500 years or so,” the Oklahoma Republican said in a Senate speech.

“And every time this happens, the

alarmists get out there and say we're all going to die.”

Inhofe, who views warnings about manmade global warming as a scientific hoax, once again took on the media and the issue during remarks.

This was his eighth floor speech on the topic.

Inhofe addressed more recent developments on the controversial topic and delivered more criticism of for-
