

# Bridges Foundation hails re-opening of its center

The Bridges Foundation celebrated the grand re-opening of its Outsource Center with a recent open house.

The renovation of the center, 1345 N. Lewis Ave., was completed in January and provides a beautiful work center for the foundation's clients.

The Outsource Center employs 30-50 people with developmental disabilities who seek to learn a trade and improve their job skills. Area businesses like IC of Oklahoma, Cintas, Mercury Marine and John Zink outsource jobs to the center, which are then completed by Bridges' clients.

The four-month renovation project improved virtually all aspects of the work area including new restrooms, lighting, windows, flooring and

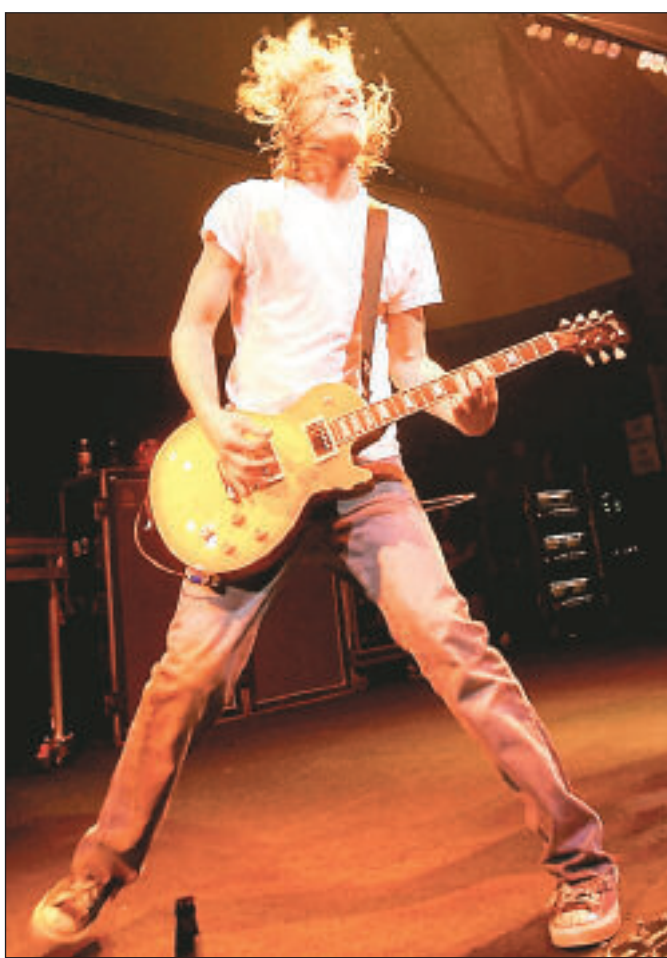

# Rapper Remy Ma convicted of shooting woman in NY

NEW YORK — Grammy-nominated rapper Remy Ma was led out of a Manhattan courtroom Thursday, weeping and in handcuffs, after being convicted of shooting a woman outside a nightclub last summer.

The defense had conceded that Remy Ma, whose real name is Remy Smith, fired a shot toward a friend she suspected of stealing \$3,000, but said it was an accident.

Smith, 26, faces up to 25 years in prison following her conviction in state Supreme Court for assault, weapon

possession and attempted coercion.

The singer was nominated for a Grammy as part of the Terror Squad for the 2004 hit "Lean Back." She also has appeared on recordings with Busta Rhymes and Eminem.

Joseph was shot after a party at a nightclub in Manhat-

tan's Chelsea neighborhood on July 14, 2007.

Assistant District Attorney Michael McIntosh said the defendant "took an illegal .45-caliber automatic and loaded it with hollow-point bullets," then used both hands to cock the weapon as she got into the car. "She took every step

you had to take to shoot somebody."

The rapper demanded that Joseph dump the contents of her purse; Joseph denied she had taken the rapper's money and refused. Fisher said the gun went off accidentally as the women struggled over the bag.
