### Satellite among best in nation

Congratulations to the staff of Satellite, which was recently honored by the Youth Editorial Alliance, part of the Newspaper Association of America Foundation.

The Tulsa World's teen section received first place in sweepstakes for its circulation size, meaning Satellite is among the best youth sections in the nation.

Individual winners include former Satellite correspondent Malisa Morsman, a Jenks High School graduate who now attends the University of Oklahoma, who won first place in the features category for her story on teen pregnancy; John Powell, a home schooler who won first place in the illustration category for his artwork of a dog left behind when his teen owner went to college; and Tulsa School of Arts and Sciences senior Catherine Roberts netted a third-place win in the personal opinion column category for her words about the final Harry Potter book.

Satellite will celebrate its 10th anniversary early next year.



### Jenks senior named Presidential Scholar

Martin Ye, a recent graduate of Jenks High School, has been named a Presidential Scholar. He is one of only 140 students in the nation selected for the honor this year. Brooke E. Sheppard of Lawton was the other state recipient.

The U.S. Presidential Scholars Program was established in 1964 to recognize and honor some of the nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors. The award is considered one of the nation's highest honors for high school students.

### Student rowing camp set

The Tulsa Rowing Club Juniors will offer two camps for beginners this summer.

Camp I will be June 23 to July 3. Camp II is scheduled Aug. 11 through 22. These camps are geared toward high school aged athletes (13-18) who are interested in learning how to row in racing shells.

The camps, provided by the Tulsa Rowing Club Juniors coaching staff, will take place at the Tulsa Rowing Club Boathouse, 715 W. 21st St. The sessions will meet 4:15-6:15 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8-10 a.m. Saturday. Participants must complete a swim test and required membership paperwork. The fee for each two-week junior summer camp is \$200.
