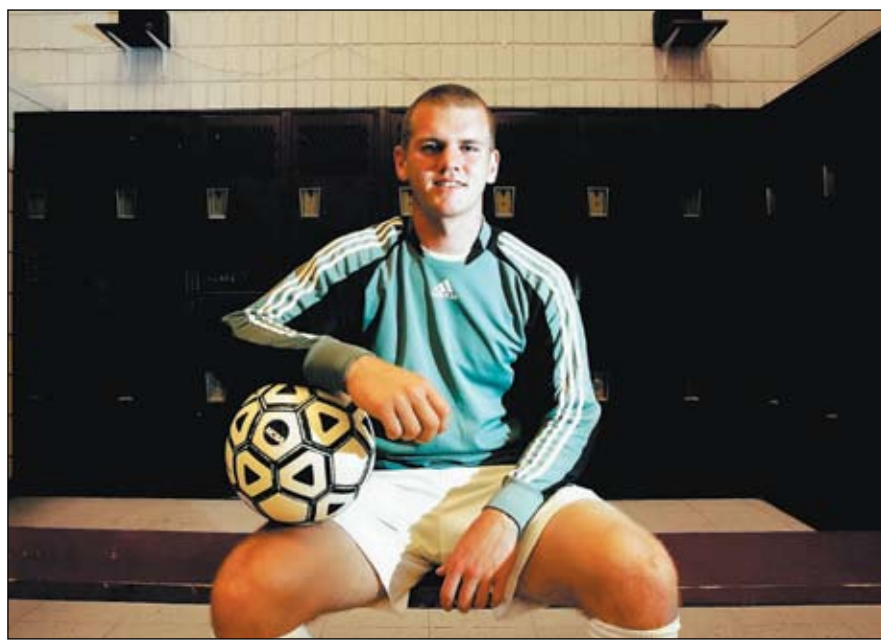

Keeper saves his best for last

• Jenks star credits family and hard work for success.

JENKS — A humble Cody Mumma says it softly, not an ounce of ego mixed with his words. “I put in long hours and hard practices,” Mumma said inside Jenks’ locker room. “I hope later down the road, some kid will look on the wall, see my picture and try to be as hard-working and diligent as I was.”

Mumma, a goalkeeper, has been named the Tulsa World’s boys metro player of the year.

Opposing coaches threw praise at the Jenks keeper during the nomination process, but no one said it better than Trojans coach John Timmons.

“His team had great confidence in him as a keeper, but they believed in him more because of the type of person that he is,” Timmons said. “His character and leadership run together. He was a rock on our team and everyone really believed in him.”

Mumma’s numbers were superlative again this season (eight shutouts, allowing only six goals and logging 32 saves), but the senior’s biggest sacrifice may have come in his freshman year.

When starting senior keeper Andrew Techanchuk was injured at midseason, Mumma received his first varsity start.

“Coach Timmons came to me the day after he got hurt and said I was going to have to be big for the rest of the year, and I took that to heart,” Mumma said.

That team advanced to the state championship game against Putnam City North. At halftime of the title game, Techanchuk took over in goal after Mumma helped guide the team to that point.

Season highlight: “It would definitely be the Jenks-Union game during the regular season this year. It was a tough game that went into penalty kicks at the end, and we were able to win it.”

Jenks coach John Timmons: “It was great to have a player like him on the field. It’s unusual to have someone that everyone completely believes in. I think his talent kind of spills over to the team.”

Mumma isn’t going far to continue his career. He’ll join Tom McIntosh’s squad at the University of Tulsa.

“Tulsa was definitely the main school that I was looking at,” Mumma said. “I decided last year that Tulsa was going to be the best option for myself and my family. They have a great soccer program and education system.”

Now, his biggest fans from nearby Jenks will be able to watch him play at the next level.

“My parents (John and Karla) have been great supporters, as has my sister Ashley,” Mumma said. “They’ve sat through many freezing games and put in many road trips and long hours.”

“I wouldn’t be where I’m at today without my family.”

Strasburg expects to be a success

• No. 1 pick in MLB draft plans to relax, wait for contract.

WASHINGTON — Relaxation is on Stephen Strasburg’s agenda for the summer. History, apparently, is not.

Asked about the spotty success rate of No. 1 draft picks over the years, the latest to claim that mantle said Wednesday he is not inclined to learn from other people’s mistakes.

“I’m sorry, but what would I learn from other top picks?” Strasburg said in a conference call. “Obviously, I watch guys that have made it to the big leagues. I don’t plan on being the top pick and then not being successful in the big leagues.”

“I obviously want to take my game to the next level, and I

believe that I’ve learned how to work hard in college and I hope to carry that over.”

The mega-hyped right-hander from San Diego State was selected Tuesday by the mega-bad Washington Nationals. Now comes a summer of negotiation and relaxation. The player will be the one doing the relaxing, while agent Scott Boras and the Nationals work out what is expected to be a record-setting contract.

“There’s obviously a few places I’d like to go, and just relax this summer and have fun,” said Strasburg, who spent last summer playing in the Olympics and just completed his college season with the Aztecs. “It’ll be good to have a little rest time, especially after the big workload I had the previous year. It’ll be a good summer to be able to lift and get stronger and have the summer I haven’t had in a while.”

Strasburg said he hasn’t followed the Nationals. That might be for the best, given the team’s worst-in-majors 15-41 record headed into Wednesday’s game against Cincinnati.

Boras, meanwhile, made it clear he feels where his client stands headed into the contract talks. The agent put Strasburg in the category of “a different breed of cat,” belonging in the 1 percent of the draft class that is low risk and worthy of big payoffs.

“An extraordinary player receiving a substantial bonus far above other draft picks has happened before ... Obviously Stephen falls into that class of players,” Boras said.

Boras wouldn’t give numbers, but he is expected to ask for a package worth several times the value of the current high-water mark of \$10.5 million that Mark Prior received in 2001.
